MINI 101: INTRODUCTION TO WOODTURNING?

We are in the process of offering (a minimum of 6 members), an introductory course for novice members – those who have little or no turning experience.

The 4-hour session, which would take place in the new year, would cover safety issues, sharpening techniques, demonstrations by senior turners and an opportunity for new members to practice various cutting techniques under the guidance of senior members of the Guild. The latter would focus on turning techniques and would not involve turning a finished product. It would take place on a Saturday in February 2025 at our regular meeting place. There would be charge of \$40 to cover the cost of hall rental and wood.

RECAP OF OCTOBER DEMONSTRATION



Kevin Jesequel is a woodturner living in Portland, Oregon. Taking an interest in hollow forms after the passing of his mother in 2020, he has quickly become recognized as one of the top hollow form artists today. His work has been published several times in American Woodturner and he has been a juried and invited artist to numerous exhibitions. He was selected by the American Association of Woodturner's POP Committee to receive the 2024 Artist Showcase at their annual symposium and enjoys

demonstrating and teaching at clubs across the country. He is an active member of two local woodturning clubs and has served as president of Cascade Woodturner's Association in 2024.

He demonstrated his process for creating hollow forms with clean lines and small openings. Through a combination of hands-on turning and discussion, the demonstration included everything from selecting the wood to mounting it on the lathe and shaping the form to hollowing and finishing. Kevin also covered tool selection and use, ergonomics and body mechanics. He showed that hollow forms do not need to be complex or require expensive tooling.

Being part of our Guild has been and is an incredible experience. Andre is not alone in feeling that the learning, the teaching, the connections, the camaraderie has been a very fulfilling experience and to be able to learn from one another and share the knowledge is most satisfying.

Lots has happened in the last 17 years.

PART 1

Island Woodturners Guild History as recalled by André Robin

Where did we come from?

I am not sure how many remember the humble beginnings of the Island Woodturners Guild. I had been wanting to document our history for years and had discussed this with a few of our past Presidents, all giving me the same answer that it was a great idea and wished me luck. Not quite the answer I was hoping for but nevertheless, I thought it was an important undertaking.

With the passing of time, it is hard to recollect exactly or even accurately. As our memory fades some facts may differ from what we think we remember. With that in mind I will take the first step and hopefully as this document develops, those that have knowledge of our history will chime in with more facts and stories.

Before the Guild

It was about 27 years ago, I am guessing 1997, or so that three enthusiastic turners, Ray Franklin, Phil Cottell and Mike Neal were at a Vancouver Island Woodworkers Guild meeting where they had a discussion about woodturning.

One of them proposed starting a Woodturning Group. Ray Franklin organized the Group and hosted the first meeting. I believe Ray, Phil, Mike and John Elmquist were amongst the first to participate in Group 1. This was the birth of what is now known as Woodturning in our area.

As time progressed the group grew in members and popularity. Claude Mury approached Ray Franklin about joining Group 1. Due to the increasing numbers wanting to join and the fact that the meetings took place in their private residences where space was limited, Ray suggested to Claude to organize a second group. Enthusiasts like Claude, Tim Soutar, Donald Porter, Graham Cox and a few others got together and Group 2 was born.

Around 2002 I met Christine Davidson and she invited me to a Group 2 meeting. At that time it was coordinated by Graham Cox. A few years later, out of necessity, as numbers were growing faster than could be accommodated in our small groups, Donald offered to form Group 3 which came about 2006.

As more and more enthusiasts were hearing about these Groups more wanted to join. We continued to grow and after few short years we had 5 active groups each having monthly meetings in each other's homes. Age and Covid took its toll on members. For a period of time some groups stopped meeting and restarted later.

Group 2 continued to meet outdoor in the summer and in the winter months indoor in my workshop.

In around 2008, during the period of growth and popularity of woodturning, an additional smaller Group of turners got together and formed Group 6. The original members for that Group were Brian Hayes, Hew Lines, Donald Porter and André.

This was organized as a hands-on group. Each member had a lathe and the project was determined ahead of time each one of us taking a turn at selecting the next project. The Group met weekly. Since then participating members have changed but the group remains active to this day. The projects have gotten a little more complex but the best part is about the socializing and camaraderie. This group is comprised of Lin Bayford, Mike Neal, Steve Werner and myself and meets in my workshop.

PARTING OFF


We are looking for members who are interested in doing a demo at our meetings or who can contribute an article for future newsletters.
