RECAP OF NOVEMBER DEMONSTRATION



Gord Kifiak demonstrated how he turns his very realistic looking flowers at our November meeting.

Gord also turns beautiful vases to hold his realistic turned flowers.



Starting with a square blank, he uses a skew to create the flower's petals.

He describes how to get the longer, more realistic petals.

After dipping the "flower" into hot water for a minute, the flower is now ready for trimming.



Gord also covered how to dye the flowers.

PART 2

Island Woodturners Guild History *as recalled by André Robin*

Leading up to our beginning

Early 2000 Woodturning had started to take hold in the area and many woodturners had joined smaller groups.

Around 2005, Graeme Evans had organized an art exhibition at the Royal Colwood Golf course where he was a member. This event was the first time local woodturners met together to display their work and socialize. It was very well attended and an opportunity for Harvey Brooks to present an idea of establishing a formal Guild associated with the American Association of Woodturners (AAW).

Harvey was asking members to show their interest by writing their names on a sign up sheet that he was circulating. Around that time he had also gone to Tools and Space to drop off another sign up sheet to try to attract more members. In addition, he had asked if he could come to a Group 1 and a Group 2 meeting to inform members and draw up more interest. Fast forward to late 2006 or early 2007, Harvey contacted the AAW organization requesting a Guild information package.

The Guild was born

It was early 2007 when I was invited to a meeting with Group 3 at an apartment complex in Colwood. The name of the person living there was Harrold. Interestingly enough he had been given a corner of the basement of the building which he had transformed into his personal workshop with a lathe, small workbench, tools etcetera

At that meeting Harvey announced that he had finalized the details to formalize the group and subsequently a committee was formed to get the Guild registered as "The Island Woodturners Guild".

On May 5th 2007, the Executive of the day signed the original request to extend the AAW privileges to our Guild. The Guild was incorporated by the Province of British Columbia and registered with the Province Society Act on 12 September 2007.

The first Executive was comprised of Harvey Brooks as the President, Donald Porter as the Vice president, André Robin as the Secretary, Christine Davidson as Treasurer and Derek Wentworth as Member-At-Large. The first Executive meeting was held in Brentwood Bay at Smitty's Pancake House. This first Executive actively worked to set up the foundation for the Guild of today.

The **Mission Statement** was adopted as follows:

"Giving Back to the Community" which involves a commitment by the Guild to work alone or with other like-minded groups to use resources for charity in the Community.

Thank you to Andre for recording the history of the Guild.

KMS TOOLS AND THE ISLAND WOODTURNERS GUILD

If you shop at KMS Tools make sure you sign up for a KMS Club account. There is no cost involved and you will save money on your purchases. Bear in mind that this is NOT a charge account.

KMS Tools has a program called Group Rewards which assists organizations such as our Guild. The Island Woodturners Guild participates in this program. Through this program KMS contributes a small percentage of members' purchases to an account in the Guild's name. The funds contributed to this account are used by the Guild to purchase items to fulfill operational requirements. This program benefits the Guild but does not benefit the individual member.

In order for your purchases to count toward this program your KMS Club account needs to be connected to the Guild Group rewards account. On your next visit to KMS, before the cashier rings through your purchases, please ask that they "confirm that your KMS Club account is linked to the Island Woodturners Guild Group Rewards account" (*NOT the Island Woodworkers Guild*). If it isn't already linked please ask them to link it.

The Guild has used funds generated through this program to purchase such as chucks, jaws, supplies needed for workshops and Gift Cards used as prizes.
