NEXT MEETING: SATURDAY March 22nd: 1:00 p.m.



This meeting will feature a hybrid demonstration by Craig Timmerman who will be showing us how to turn a **Flying Bowl**. Turning bowls from parallelogram shapes (square, rectangle, rhombus, rhomboid), Craig typically turns a rhombus shaped bowl with wings that curve down, but in this demo, will demonstrate the flying bowl shape. This demo is best done on a lathe with a 16" or

larger swing. On smaller lathes he demonstrates a basic winged bowl using a square blank.

The Zoom invite to the meeting will be sent out on Thursday, March 20th. The demo will be followed by a presentation of the *Show and Tell*.

RECAP OF FEBRUARY DEMONSTRATION



This meeting featured a hybrid demonstration by Kai Munzer who showed us how to turn an elegant cube shaped box with winged corners that has a sphere shaped inside. He explored a unique box shape and taught us how to build a dedicated wooden clamp in addition to many other skills.

Sourcing Free Wood for Woodturning: Your Ultimate Guide

Woodturning is a delightful craft that transforms raw wood into beautiful, intricate pieces. But let's be honest, wood can be expensive! Fortunately, there are numerous ways to source free wood for your projects. Here are some top tips:

1. Local Tree Services

Reach out to local arborists and tree removal services. Often, they're more than happy to give away wood rather than pay disposal fees. Build a relationship with them, and you might become their go-to person for leftover wood—think of it as a mutual "wood-en" friendship.

2. Storm Damage

After storms, many homeowners have fallen trees or branches that they need to dispose of. Post on local community boards or social media groups offering to help clean up in exchange for the wood. It's like a win-win: you get wood, and they get to avoid a headache—stormy weather, stormy friendships!

3. Construction Sites

Construction and demolition sites can be treasure troves for free wood. Ask site managers if you can take offcuts, beams, or other wood that's otherwise destined for the landfill. Ensure you have permission and follow safety guidelines. Just don't be surprised if you start seeing them eyeing your coffee and donut.

4. Craigslist and Freecycle

Websites like Craigslist and Freecycle often have listings for free wood. Keep an eye on the "free" section and be ready to act quickly when something good pops up. If you blink, you might miss it—just remember to keep those refresh skills sharp!

5. Firewood Sellers

Contact firewood sellers and ask if they have any pieces unsuitable for splitting. These often include unique shapes and sizes that are perfect for woodturning. You might get

the oddest looks, but hey, one man's trash is another man's crafting treasure!

6. Recycling Centers

Some recycling centers or transfer stations allow people to take wood and other materials for free. Call ahead to see if they have a program like this. It's like a scavenger hunt for grown-ups, with the bonus of helping out Mother Earth.

7. Roadside Finds

While driving around, keep an eye out for wood left by the curb. People often put out branches, logs, or even furniture they no longer want. Always make sure it's okay to take it. Just make sure you have enough room in your car—because nothing says "I love woodturning" quite like driving home with a log in the passenger seat.

8. Community Gardens or Farms

These places often have prunings and branches they need to dispose of. You might be the superhero they never knew they needed, swooping in to save the day (and take the wood).

9. Other Guild Members and Woodturners

Woodturners, in my experience, tend to be generous with not only their time but also their wood supply. Don't be afraid to occasionally put an ask out for a piece of wood or two, especially if you have a specific project in mind. Just be prepared for them to ask you to reciprocate with your finest finished pieces!

Conclusion: With a bit of resourcefulness and a keen eye, you can find an abundance of free wood for your woodturning projects. Just remember to always ask for permission when taking wood from private property or business premises and follow safety protocols when handling reclaimed wood.

So go forth, fellow woodturner, and may your shavings be plentiful and your wood always free!

Volunteer Positions


